The notion that science is a charter of certainty is one that pervades popular images of science and also surfaces in judicial opinions. Yet scientists understand that much of what they do is characterized by bias, interest, and motivation. In light of the view that these characteristics signal junk science, what do judges need to know about the science in their courtrooms? A recent survey found that judges neither understand science nor Daubert, and yet believe that they understand both. Thus, a

decade after the Supreme Court's seminal opinion in *Daubert v. Merrill Dow Pharms. Inc.*, evaluating science continues to perplex the courts and other legal actors. Each of the participants on this panel has a distinct perspective on this issue and each will discuss various aspects of the problem from an interdisciplinary perspective.
